WANTING TO ADOPT A PET? HERE'S WHAT TO DO!

Pets in RPM's Program

Are you interested in adopting a pet from RPM's (Rescued Pets Movement) program? Here's what you need to know:

1. RPM's Adoption Policy

RPM typically does not adopt pets locally. When RPM rescues an animal, there is usually a
plan for their transport to rescue partners up north, where they often even have a forever
home waiting. Breaking this arrangement would disrupt these established plans and
damage the relationship we have with our partner groups that allow us to continue saving
lives.

2. Houston's Overpopulation Crisis

Houston faces severe pet overpopulation. To address this, RPM focuses on transporting
pets to regions with lower animal populations and more families looking to adopt,
therefore helping to alleviate the crisis locally.

3. Alternatives for Adopting Pets

 Most animals in RPM's program come from local shelters, like BARC (Houston's city shelter). If you fall in love with an RPM pet already slated for transport, consider visiting local shelters to find a similar pet needing a home.

Adopting from Public, Taxpayer Funded Shelters

Local shelters in Houston are overwhelmed and urgently need adopters. Here's why adopting from them is beneficial:

- <u>Comprehensive Vetting:</u> Pets come fully vetted, including spay/neuter surgeries, vaccinations, and microchips. However, heartworm treatment, if needed, is generally not included.
- <u>Affordable Fees:</u> Adoption fees at city and county shelters, such as BARC and Harris County Pets, are very affordable ranging from \$20 to \$80.

Adopting from Rescue Groups

If public shelters aren't your preference, consider the numerous local rescue groups and private shelters:

- <u>Detailed Pet Profiles:</u> Rescue groups can provide more detailed information about a pet's behavior and temperament, often through foster homes.
- <u>Specific Needs:</u> If you have specific requirements (e.g., a dog that doesn't bark or is good with kids), rescue groups can better match you with a suitable pet.
- <u>Fully Vetted:</u> While adoption fees may be higher when adopting from a private rescue instead of a shelter, these animal receive extensive vetting beyond just the basics that shelters provide.

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Treatment for heartworms and many other common illnesses have been treated by the rescues, and pets have generally had all of their rounds of vaccines. That being said, many pets in rescues are completely healthy! Do not assume you need to avoid adopting in order to get a healthy pet; that is far from the case!

- Foster to Adopt: Adopting a pet is a significant commitment and responsibility. If you're uncertain about making a long-term commitment, many rescue groups offer a "foster-toadopt" option, allowing you to care for a pet before deciding to adopt permanently. This process involves taking the pet home and caring for them on a temporary basis, giving you a chance to see if they fit well into your lifestyle. If they aren't a good fit, just foster until they find another family who is the perfect match! Foster homes often have the first option to adopt the pet if they decide they want to keep them. Each rescue group has its own policies, so it's important to check with them about how their foster-to-adopt program works. Fostering provides a "test run" to ensure the pet is a good match for your home and family. Additionally, rescue groups typically offer support and resources to foster homes, including supplies and veterinary care, allowing you to help a pet in need without the immediate pressure of a lifelong commitment. To get started, contact local rescue groups and inquire about their foster-to-adopt options. Make sure to understand the process and prepare your home to welcome a pet, even temporarily. Fostering is a great way to see if you're ready for the responsibilities of pet ownership while providing a temporary home for a pet in need. It's a win-win situation for both you and the animal!

- <u>Search Websites:</u> Use websites to search for specific breeds available for adoption in local shelters and rescue groups such as Petfinder.com and 24PetConnect.com
- <u>Set Alerts:</u> petplace.com/pet-adoption/ allows you to set up email alerts for when a specific breed becomes available! Simply run a search for what you are looking for, then click "Create Search Alert"
